What To Do When Stain Dries Too Fast

Unlike oil stains, water-based stains and lacquer stains dry very fast. On large or complex surfaces you may have trouble getting the excess stain wiped off before it dries. If this happens, you'll be left with streaks like those shown in the accompanying picture.



If you have this situation, try to correct it by quickly wiping the surface with more of the same stain. The fresh stain will reliquify the streaks unless the stain has dried too much. Then work faster to remove the excess or work on smaller areas at a time.

If the stain dries hard, you may have to use paint stripper to get the streaks removed. Then sand lightly and restain. You don't need to sand all the color out of the wood before restaining.

To avoid the problem to begin with, divide your project into smaller sections and work on each of these separately, or get a second person to help—one applying the stain, the other wiping off

Countersink Tip

With most drawers, I don't need to worry about adding the pulls until after the pieces are glued together. But with some small drawers this can get you into trouble. The pilot holes aren't the problem — they can be drilled from the front. But when the mounting screw needs to be countersunk, the drill is often too big to fit inside the drawer. Fortunately, there's a quick solution.



First reverse the countersink cutter on the end of the drill bit, as shown in the photo. Then insert the bit through the pilot hole and chuck it in the drill. Now to countersink the hole, all you have to do is reverse the direction of the drill and gently pull back on the bit.

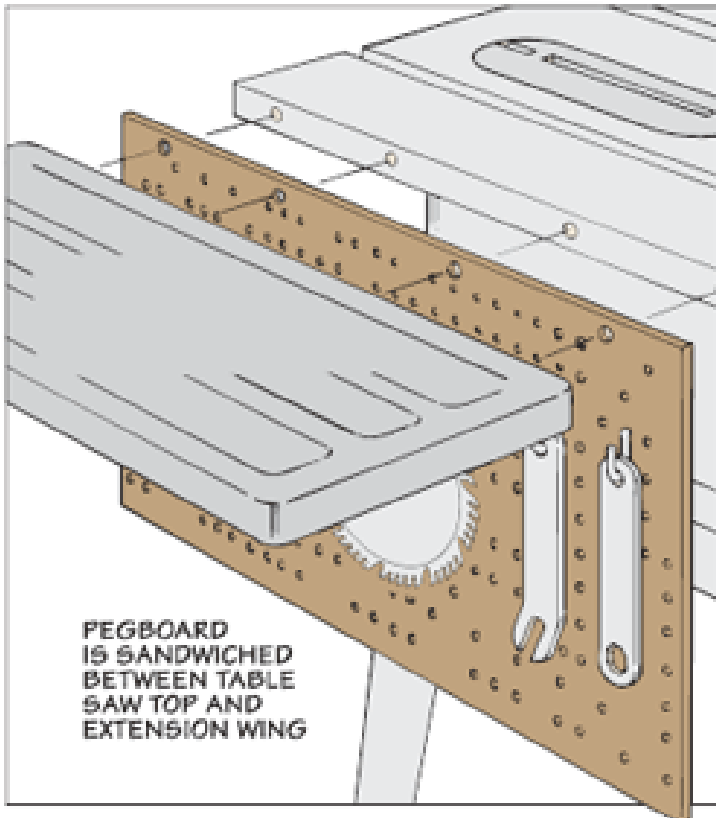

Vertical Tool Hangers

With just a little ingenuity, you can add storage in unlikely places, like you see in the drawing and photo below.

A good way to add storage to your contractor's saw is to sandwich a piece of pegboard between the extension wings and the top of the table saw. The pegboard hangs below the table and provides a way to store wrenches, blades, and other saw accessories.



To add storage to your workbench, you can nail some cleats to the legs and upper and lower end rails of the bench (above right). Then place the pegboard against the cleats and tack a second set of cleats down to hold the pegboard in place.
