

Repair Furniture Before Refinishing

Furniture that needs refinishing often needs some regluing or wood repair. It's almost always best to do all the regluing, parts repair and parts replacements before doing the stripping. This is so that any glue seepage or damage you might cause happens on top of the old finish. When it is then removed with the stripping, so are the glue seepage and the damage.


The exceptions are when the wood is covered with paint or a heavy glaze and you need to patch or replace a part or some veneer but can't see what the wood is. You will have to strip the paint or finish, or at least some of it, to reveal the wood.

Extension Cord Storage



Without my small collection of extension cords, I think work in the shop would slowly grind to halt. But trying to keep these cords untangled and easily accessible was always a

major challenge. The answer to this housekeeping problem was the storage rack you see in the photograph.



The wall rack consists of a board outfitted with a series of “hook and loop” cord holders. The loops are made from 1' long sections of nylon cord. The cord is knotted in a loop and then passed through a counterbored hole in the board, as shown in the drawing. An eye hook installed above the cord completes the holder.

The coiled cords are held securely in place on the rack, but easy to get to when I need one.



Wood Plug Drill Press Jig

Cutting wood plugs can be a tedious and time-consuming task. So I built a jig to make it easier.

This jig cuts plugs in long rows on narrow strips of wood, so there's minimal waste left around each plug. And once the plugs are cut, they can be stored on the long, thin strip or cut from the strip using a bandsaw.



The jig, shown in the photo above, is made up of two parts. The first part is a small (6" x 12") plywood base that gets clamped to the drill press table for stability. The second part is a hardwood fence that prevents lifting of the workpiece and guides the plug stock and the plug cutter.

To make the fence, I cut a wide rabbet on the bottom edge. You'll want to be sure the height of the rabbet is greater than the length of plug you want to make. Finally, glue the fence to the base so the rabbet faces forward.

Then use your plug cutter to cut a guide hole in the top fence. To center the plug cutter over the plug stock, you'll want to place the guide hole along the back edge of the rabbet and cut away a small amount of fence, as shown in the detail. Now slip your stock in the jig and you're ready to go.



Cut-Off Sled Hold-Down



One of the problems using a cut-off sled is that as the workpieces get shorter, your fingers get closer and closer to the blade. To solve this problem, I simply added a hold-down to the sled, like the one you see in the photograph at right.

Since the small workpiece is secured tightly to the sled, it provides greater safety. And it also ensures that you'll be able to make a more accurate cut.



To make this modification, just drill a $\frac{5}{16}$ " hole at one end of the sled that will accept a short piece of threaded rod. The location of the hole depends on the type of hold-down you'll be using. It just needs to be located close enough for the hold-down to secure a small workpiece firmly in place.

Next, install a $\frac{5}{16}$ " T-nut on the underside of the sled. Use a Forstner bit to make a counterbore to recess the T-nut. This will prevent the T-nut from hanging up as the sled is pushed along the table.

Now, all that's left is to slip a hold-down over the threaded rod, add a star knob, and the modification is complete. When you need to cut larger pieces all you need to do is to remove the assembly.
